 Down in the henhouse, somethin' stirred, when he shouted "Who's there?" this is what he heard:

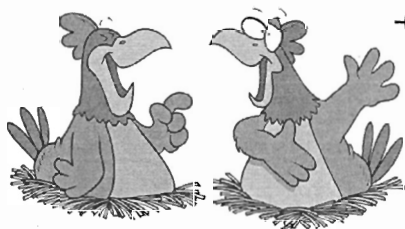
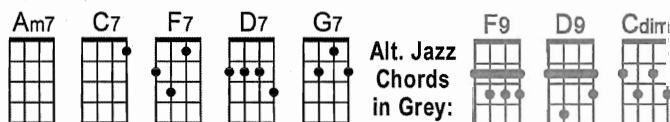


Am7 C7

 So, quiet yourself and stop your fuss, there ain't nobody here but us.

Kindly point that gun, the other way.  
 Am7 F7(Cdim) G7 Am7  
 And hobble, hobble, hobble off and. hit the hay."



Return to Coda, then end with:

C C7 F  
 "Hey, boss man, what do you say?"  
 D7(D9) G7 C C7  
 "It's easy pickins, there ain't nobody here but us chickens!"
